South Street *recycling* ...a fresh look.

The availability of recycling containers for separation of waste and the new signs will encourage staff and visitors to put "the right waste in the right place" at South Street Hospital.

Take a walk through the buildings at South Street Hospital these days and you will notice that the recycling containers have a new look. Gerard Campbell, on site manager of housekeeping, has been adding new signs to the recycling containers located in the corridors outside meeting rooms and clinics as well as in the Busby Room and Holdsworth Auditorium. There are separate containers for cans, glass, plastic, and mixed paper as well as a general waste container in each location. This new layout and signage will make recycling easier throughout SSH while educating staff on the environmental impact of these materials being sent to landfill. A big thank you to Gerard for taking the initiative to help us improve recycling at the hospital.





In other areas of the hospital where there are only general waste containers, new signage with the Eco Stewardship logo has been posted asking for help to recycle and letting people know there are recycling containers available throughout our buildings. Locating one of these signs means that recycling bins are nearby and that you are encouraged to locate and use them.





Cutting down

"We care about the environment, and strive to use products that protect the world around us."





Together with our grounds management partner, Clintar, we have been caring for our hospital grounds without the use of pesticides for two years now. Recently, we have made a movement toward reducing greenhouse gas emissions by reducing the frequency of grass cutting at London's hospitals. By using a 'stepped' approach, grass is cut less often as we move away from the main buildings. One of the areas where this will make a large difference is across the street from Victoria hospital. The large field on the corner of Wellington and Commissioners road was cut on a weekly basis

until now. The cutting has now been reduced to twice a year. This change in cutting frequency will greatly reduce the amount of gasoline and diesel used by the lawn mowing equipment and the resulting carbon dioxide emission reduction will amount to approximately 5,000 kg per year.

Our green space

In the last few years we've seen green space enhancement around the hospital such as the healing garden at the London Regional Cancer Centre and the Drake memorial garden at University hospital. Through funding from the Children's Hospital and special donors, LHSC will be supported in the creation of a new butterfly healing garden at Victoria Hospital.







Buying green! The new standard for London's hospitals

Every day LHSC employees use many different types of materials and supplies to perform a variety of functions across organization. These materials and supplies represent 80% of our Ecological Footprint! With this staggering number in mind, the LHSC Ecological Stewardship Team approached Healthcare Materials Management Services (HMMS) with an idea...could we consider the environmental impacts of products and supplies before even buying them? HMMS responded with a resounding "YES"!

Toby O'Hara, Manager of Logistics and Strategic Sourcing at HMMS is sending out a clear message: "Start thinking green - we're going to be introducing it into our purchasing decisions." Beginning May 2007, specific environmental criteria was added to Request for Proposal Documents (RFPs). These RFPs include the requirement that any vendor wishing to do business with the London Hospitals must report on their environmental policies and practices. Current vendors are also being asked to participate by filling out a survey which will demonstrate their environmental performance. When tallied, these results will act as a useful tool to measure and monitor our environmental purchasing goals.


