The online auction sale begins at 7 am on May 11, and it begins to close on Wednesday, May 25 at 9 pm. Please note: The auction will have a soft close to prevent someone from "sniping" (winning by placing a bid at the last second). If a new bid is placed at the end of the auction, the sale is automatically extended another 2 minutes to allow all bidders another opportunity. This ensures the item goes to the highest bidder.

Briefly,

- 1. **Register to bid.** Create an account and provide your credit card information. If you already have an account with Timewell Auctions, you do not need to create a new one. This is a secure site with all data encrypted and PCI compliance in place with up-to-date SSL certificates. If you do not have access to a computer, Timewell Auctions can place your bid (519.631.6884).
- 2. **Bid on what you want.** You can list the maximum amount that you are willing to pay for an item. The computer software will bid on your behalf up to that amount, but only when bidding increases. It will not automatically enter your maximum bid unless other bidders increase the bids to that level.
