Program Goal and Objectives

Upon completion of the LRCP residency program, the physicist should be capable of working safely, competently, professionally and independently in a modern radiation treatment facility.

Qualifications

The residency program is open to graduates of Medical Physics graduate programs, with preference given to Ph.D. applicants. The applicant requires a strong foundation in basic physics, as evidenced by the minimum of a minor equivalence in undergraduate physics... Preference will be given to graduates of a CAMPEP-accredited Graduate Program and those applying with a M.Sc. must be from a CAMPEP accredited Medical Physics graduate program.

Duration and Stipend

The residency program is a two year program and compensation is outlined in The Professional Institute of the Public Service of Canada Collective Agreement.
